

Hailed by The New York Times as "splendid," and "one of New York's finest organists," Renée Anne Louprette maintains an international career as organ recitalist, collaborative artist, conductor, and teacher, and is director of the National Competition in Organ Improvisation. She is a U.S.-Romanian Fulbright Scholar who spent the Fall 2022 season in Braşov, Transylvania, completing research on historic Romanian pipe organs. She is Assistant Professor of Music and College Organist at Bard College where she directs the Bard Baroque Ensemble and leads an annual Bach cantata series. She has directed the organ program at Mason Gross School of the Arts, Rutgers University since 2013 and is a former faculty member at the Manhattan School of Music, The Hartt School of the University of Hartford, and the John J. Cali School of Music of Montclair State University.

Ms. Louprette has performed solo organ recitals at Royal Festival Hall in London, Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles, the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris, and at festivals in Italy, Germany, Switzerland, Belgium, France, Denmark, Sweden, Romania, and the United Kingdom. She has appeared as concerto soloist with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra in Australia, the Auburn Symphony Orchestra in Seattle, and The Orchestra Now in New York. Additional collaborations have included the Mostly Mozart Festival Orchestra, Piffaro, American Brass Quintet, Los Angeles Dance Project, American saxophonist Paul Cohen, Romanian saxophonist Zoltán Réman, and traditional Irish musician Ivan Goff. She has released solo recordings of the music of J. S. Bach and 20th-century French organ masterworks to critical acclaim. Her current recording of Bach's Clavier-Übung III performed on the Craighead-Saunders organ of Christ Church, Rochester, New York, is scheduled for release in 2023.

Renée Anne Louprette holds a Master of Music degree in conducting from Bard College Conservatory, a Bachelor of Music degree summa cum laude in piano performance and Graduate Professional Diploma in organ performance from The Hartt School, University of Hartford. She was awarded a Premier Prix – mention très bien – from the Conservatoire National de Région de Toulouse, France and a Diplôme Supérieur in organ performance from the Centre d'Études Supérieures de Musique et de Danse de Toulouse, where she studied with Michel Bouvard, Jan Willem Jansen (interpretation) and Philippe Lefebvre (improvisation).

FROM THE DEAN

Our chapter, along with many visitors and members of other local AGO chapters, recently enjoyed the 2023 President's Day Organ Festival

in Beverly Hills. Organizer Nelson Dodge assembled a variety of artists who performed a diverse array of repertoire

throughout the day on five con-

trasting instruments. We enjoyed early and Romantic era music, organ with other instruments, modern literature, and were even treated to a performance on a continuo organ. A good time was had by all, it seemed, until our feature artist performed a transcription of *Bohemian Rhapsody* by the renowned rock band Queen. I found this to be quite ingenious and enjoyable even though the song is not among my favorites. I noticed a reaction spread throughout the room at this moment, and I identified this as a possible topic for further discussion.

The Los Angeles Chapter, AGO is a national leader in programming, events, educational initiatives, and presenting a diverse group of artists who enable us to experience diverse repertoire for the organ. Yet, I felt an undeniable energy within the room when the *Bohemian Rhapsody* began. Our audience very visibly separated into two factions: one seemed to find the transcription quite enjoyable, while the other overtly "endured" the experience.

The Los Angeles Chapter has an enviable reputation as a chapter which often refrains from judging fellow members following performances. While the AGO as a whole may have a reputation for some members following scores in the front pews, often in plain sight of the performer, our chapter has supported its members and its guest artists to a degree far beyond that of other organizations. When it comes to progressive or exploratory music and utilizing the organ to support performances which are not a common application for our instruments, we need to extend our same courtesy and support for those who are performing.

I personally enjoy a very wide variety of music because it is art. I am not insinuating everyone's art must be enjoyed by all; we each have our tastes. Our respect and support, however, are favors we can all offer to one another as fellow artists. Our fellow members and guest artists work very hard to present us with a purpose-driven artistic experience. In the case of a recent performance where the organist performed a piece which referenced a genocide, the emotions conveyed were intentionally difficult and designed to leave the listener with many thoughts to consider. The piece was very moving even though difficult to experience at times. This effect is no different when an artist challenges us to experience our rather traditional instrument in non-traditional ways.

Supporting our fellow artists in new endeavors

I support music with particularly moving or powerful messages. In the case of rap, the poetry, sociopolitical, and socioeconomic commentary accompanied by predominantly rhythmic music can be surprisingly inspiring much like an abstract art exhibit can be inspiring to an unsuspecting but receptive patron. The music history behind the development of rap is fascinating, and the pioneering artists have equally interesting stories. Popular artists Lizzo and Dua Lipa combine generally inspiring messages with rhythmic electronic music, yet I understand it may not be for everyone. Are there bad messages and bad art available? Absolutely, just as there are bad organ performances and bad organ music available.

The organ comes into play here as organists and artists move forward to keep the instrument relevant in the music industry in both traditional and new ways. More than one of our chapter members have recently played the organ for rock band events, such as a recent event with the band Korn. Shortly after our Presidents' Day Organ Festival another chapter member presented a concert with a rock band which I was lamentably unable to attend, but I was certainly curious and regretted not being able to attend and participate in the experience. In Philadelphia, a recent organ showcase event at a concert hall included a "sonic experience" event where patrons laid supine on the stage floor and experienced what the sound of the organ did to their bodies as it played. This was followed by a "rave" where the organ accompanied a DJ as patrons danced on stage. Are these events my "cup of tea?" For me, no they are not, but I will support the artists who create them because they bring new interest to the organ and its use in various ways. Such initiatives can potentially attract new students who may be intrigued by the instrument as well as introduce existing musical artists to the organ in new and innovative ways.

You and I are called to be unconditional supporters for our fellow artists. Whether we particularly enjoy or detest a genre of organ use, we should remain unified in our support for our fellow artists who use the organ in new and musically progressive ways. Approach it as you approach a popular new exhibit at the museum:

- <u>Observe</u>, the art objectively and allow the it to affect you in the same way any other visual or performance art exhibit may affect you.
- <u>Study</u> the properties of the art and media being presented.
- <u>Identify</u> your feelings about the art, including positive and negative or uncomfortable emotions.
- <u>Think</u> about how the art speaks to you and acknowledge the impact it has had on you.
- <u>Review</u> whether this experience has been positive or negative for you and summarize your thoughts.
- <u>Learn</u> from your experience and identify what knowledge you have gained from the presentation.

Art is not about entertaining everyone in the audience; art is about sharing or even invoking a message, emotion, or experience. When an organist begins an innovative endeavor, I would encourage everyone to find a learning experience in the presentation even if the genre of music is not your preferred repertoire for the organ. In some cases, the performance may be an excellent demonstration of registration and proper orchestration of a transcription. What one learns from the performance of a popular rock tune regarding effective orchestration, use of coupling and expression, and effectively reducing a large score could well translate into your treatment of your next organ symphony or traditional transcription for organ.

How does this article make you feel? Do you agree? Do you disagree? Please feel free to share your thoughts so we can maintain a productive dialogue and encourage broad, mutual support and encouragement for our young artists, musically progressive artists, and our traditional repertoire fans alike.

Message text:


My dear Hazel,

JAMES CALHOUN

Dr. James Calhoun's musical training began at the age of five studying the piano and singing in the youth choir at Macedonia Baptist Church in the Watts area of Los Angeles. He went on to graduate from the University of Southern CA, where he studied with Dr. Ladd Thomas and received the Bachelors, Masters, and Doctoral degrees with a major in organ performance and minor in church/sacred music. He currently serves as Director of Music/Organist at Community United Methodist Church, Huntington Beach and Organist at the University Seventh-day Adventist Church, Los Angeles. For 24 years, he was organist, and coordinator of music

ministries at the historic Second Baptist Church (the oldest African-American Baptist congregation in Los Angeles), as well as a four year residency as organist at Holman United Methodist Church, Los Angeles.

As educator, he taught at the University of La Verne, Loyola Marymount University, University of California at Irvine, and Cypress College. He enjoys traveling including a tour with the Paul Smith Singers to Munich, Frankfurt, Lucerne, Essen, and Vienna. In March 2010 he performed with the Albert McNeil Jubilee Singers in concert at Lincoln Center (Avery Fisher Hall), both as soloist and accompanist. Other travels have included New Zealand and Australia.



ABRAHAM FABELLA

Abraham Fabella is a composer, conductor and keyboardist based in Southern California. He has been the Organist and Choirmaster at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Riverside for fifteen years. He has previously served Episcopal, Lutheran, and Methodist congregations in LA and the San Francisco area. He received his master's degree in music composition at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music studying with composer Conrad Susa. He also received degrees in music and education from UC Riverside and La Sierra University (LSU) respectively. He studied piano with Kimo Smith and briefly studied organ with Donald Vaughn at LSU.

Abe is additionally the Director of Collaborative Keyboard Arts at Santa Margarita Catholic High School in Orange County, the Accompanist of Raincross Master Chorale, and the Music

Director of Riverside Lyric Opera and Genesis Opera Theatre in Escondido. He is a private piano and voice instructor and is previously a board member of the Music Teachers' Association of California, Riverside County.

NICOLAS GALINAITIS

Nicholas Galinaitis is the Director of Music at Newport Harbor Lutheran, concert pianist and organist. Originally from Taneytown, Maryland, he has been trained by Dr. David Kreider in Westminster, Maryland and Leticia Gomez-Taglé, in Vienna, Austria. He is a frequent performer and plays over twenty concerts a year and is currently focusing on the music of Sergei Rachmaninoff for the composer's 150th birth anniversary. Venues have included the Los Angeles Breakfast Club in Los Angeles, the "Art For Hearts' Sake" concert series in Baltimore, as well as various small local performances which were all warmly received. In his spare time, he enjoys attending concerts, looking for good restaurants in Los Angeles, and writing poetry - some of which has been published in the *Cimarron Review*. PHILIP HOCH

California native, Dr. Philip Hoch, is the Artist Teacher of Organ and Visiting Assistant Professor of Music History at the University of Redlands Conservatory of Music. Dr. Hoch also serves as organist for Shepherd's Grove Presbyterian Church in Irvine, which houses the televised church program, Hour of Power with Bobby Schuller, seen weekly by millions of viewers on the Trinity Broadcasting Network.

Philip was introduced to the organ at age five through his grandmother and concert organist,

Dr. Olga Schmidt. After studying with her in his youth, Philip earned a bachelor's (2016) and master's degrees (2018) from the University of Redlands, where he was a student of world-renowned organist Frederick Swann. Under Swann's tutelage, Philip performed all his recitals from memory, many of which featured demanding works by Paul Hindemith, Alexandre Guilmant, and Maurice Duruflé. He was a two-time recipient of the President's Honor Recital (2016 and 2017), where he performed a recital in the presence of the University's president. He was inducted into the elite music honor society, Pi Kappa Lambda, in 2016, in recognition of his academic excellence and service to the Conservatory of Music.

Following his studies at the University of Redlands, Philip earned a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Herb Alpert School of Music at the University of California, Los Angeles. He studied organ performance with Dr. Christoph Bull, a specialist in improvisation, recreating pop and rock & roll pieces on the organ, and hymnody. From 2019 to 2021, Philip had the privilege of serving as Organ Scholar at the First Congregational Church of Los Angeles.

In his dissertation, *Transcribing Philip Glass's Glassworks: Historiography, Case Study, Methodology*, Dr. Hoch reevaluates and investigates contemporary practices for organ transcription, offering a compelling perspective through minimalist works. His dissertation study discloses a thorough methodology for creating an organ transcription of Philip Glass's Glassworks, which premiered in May 2021 at FCCLA. Hoch's areas of specialization include organ performance, transcription studies, minimalism studies, organ registration practices, liturgical studies, and works by Philip Glass.

As an educator, Dr. Hoch aspires to cultivate dynamic artists that are well-versed in organ performance practicum, diverse repertoire, and history and development of the instrument.

February 12, 2023 was a remarkable day for the Ruth and Clarence Mader Memorial Scholarship Fund as the 50th Anniversary Composition Competition winning piece, Midnight Toccatas, by Dr. Aaron Travers, was debuted by David Briggs in a dazzling performance. The piece was also to be performed by Stephen Tharp, but illness prevented his playing this very challenging and substantial solo

organ work. Both Briggs and Tharp

rounded out the evening's performance with their own organ transcriptions of orchestral works. Dr. Frank Ticheli, who served as one of the competition judges, hosted informative interview sessions with Briggs and Travers.

Many thanks to Jim Buonemani and his wonderful team at St. James-in-the-City for their excellent work, incredible instrument, and enthusiastic hospitality to the

performers, composer, and audience members in person and on the livestream. Thanks also to the Los Angeles Chapter for hosting the

courtyard reception between the choral evensong and the concert.
