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# FROM THE DEAN KEVIN CARTWRIGHT

I am happy to be able to take this opportunity to wish each of you a Happy New Year and extend my best wishes for a prosperous and creative New Year. I realize I am not alone in stating the year 2023 was a year of change – in many cases drastic change – for many of us. It is easy to assume the word

"change," especially the phrase "drastic change," might have a negative connotation, but to the contrary these words can ring as positive with the right perspective. I'd like to invite you to reflect on 2023 and remember the changes which have occurred in your life, whether positive or negative.

What do we do with these changes? What do we do with changes in our churches, performance groups, and our artistic community? Do we recoil and resist? Do we proceed cautiously and conservatively? Do we embrace change and progress forward? Of course, our response will justifiably vary based on the nature and consequences of the change. But our response particularly depends on our state of mind when we observe or participate in change. There has been a lot of discussion about change within the AGO leadership structure, change in our policies following the now-infamous FTC settlement, and other changes which naturally flow with time. I observe that in many cases our initial reaction to change is often negative, resistive, and met with suspicion. But it doesn't need to be. If we view our world with negativity and resistance, then it is natural our initial reaction to anything new will be negative and resistant. If we view our world from a position of hope and peace, with balanced criticism and trust for forward progress, the changes around us simply will not cause so much stress.

I frequently observe conversations throughout the AGO and other common interest groups which commiserate about "how things used to be," then criticize how things are today. Isn't it funny how we have learned to uplift the good and filter the negative from our past, yet it seems so difficult to do so in our present? In my December 2023 message, I encouraged everyone to be a light unto the darkness around us as we so symbolize with the candles we light on our menorahs and in our churches during the shortening of days, just as we symbolize with the celebrations of Hannukah: festival of lights, and Advent: the promised coming of a new Light unto the world. This New Year I would like to encourage each of you to apply

this principle to the changes we see around us: will you celebrate the lengthening of our days, or will you lament our continued plunge into the cold of winter? Can you imagine the beauty and joy of Easter and the accompanying springtime as you plan your music during this dark, cold season of the year?

Can you lose yourself while planning for the festive seasons of Advent and Christmas, Hannukah, and the general holiday season during the oppressive heat of summertime? Are you experiencing changes in your

own parishes and music programs, and are they

positive or negative? Are these changes possibly negative for you due to your perspective?

I can't answer any of the preceding questions for you; it is up to you to apply your own perspective to both past and future changes. The new year is only a symbolic moment where we acknowledge the past year and its changes, hope for

a good year to come, and when we wish each other well to mark the occasion. But don't let your hopes and dreams for the new year stop shortly after January I. My wish for each of you is: may you keep your light aglow year-round; may you see the good in everyone and every place; may you take any backward steps back in stride with the hope of the coming steps forward; and may you never give up hope for the world to come.

Now that you've read this far, I am sure you are wondering what the term "farewell" in the title of this message is about. In 2023 I also embarked on a significant journey of change, a journey which will have a long-lasting impact on my life, worldview, and professional path. Change began for me in late winter of 2023, and what an avalanche of change it was. Between career changes, relationship changes, a widespread re-alignment of friendships and social circles, and a large amount of self-realization, the collective changes in my life are calling me away from Los Angeles. I hoped to remain in the Los Angeles area until my retirement, but God apparently has a different plan which He set into motion this past spring. When doors closed in some areas, others were opened shortly thereafter. One thing about which I am glad is my trust in God to lead me in the direction He wanted me to follow, never doubting where it may lead even when I could not see my next calling. In the fullness of time my new call was revealed, and after a period of careful discernment I am making the bittersweet announcement of my

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permanent departure from the Los Angeles area in January of 2024, bound for the Northeastern United States in order to continue doing what I do best: tuning and maintaining pipe organs, and nothing else.

So, to follow my own lesson from this month's Dean's Message, I am choosing to focus on the positive elements of this change, as large as the challenges may be. After all, I am from the East Coast and I will be a one-seat train ride from family.

The liturgical music scene in the region is that with which I am best accustomed from childhood and early adulthood. Of course, the weather is not ideal, the people aren't Los Angeles

people, and there is no chapter of the AGO anywhere quite like the Los Angeles Chapter. I will dearly miss seeing all of you on a regular basis, and I am eternally grateful to our chapter for putting its trust in me over the past eight seasons. As bittersweet as departing may be, I am happy with my new calling, and I am positive it will bring fulfillment and wonderful new experiences. I will be back to visit Los Angeles quite regularly, however, and I look forward to seeing everyone at various LA AGO events this season and next.

The Los Angeles Chapter celebrated the holidays at St. Paul's Commons (previously the Cathedral Center of St. Paul) in Echo Park on December 4. The program included carolers, an eclectic array of seasonal literature using organ, harpsichord, sackbut ensemble, hurdy-gurdys, and voice.

Participants included Alexandra Ophsal (cornetto), Brad Close, Nick Daley, and Noah Gladstone (sackbuts), Curtis Berak and Taryn Spink (hurdy-gurdy), Edward Murray and Zach Neufeld (organ and harpsichord), Evan Griffith (piano and organ), Marina Harris (soprano), and "A Little Dickens Carolers" directed by Leanna Brand.

Composers included Frescobaldi, Praetorius, Speer, Handel, Drischner, Mozart, Daquin, Bach, Adam, Gruber, and Griffith. An original composition for baritone and soprano was premiered by Evan Griffith, newly appointed organist-music director of St. Athanasius Chapel at St. Paul's Commons.

The program ended with all invited to join in singing Silent Night.

The program objective was to give the audience a diverse array of music that was both uplifting and entertaining. The use of uncommon instruments (sackbut, cornetto, hurdygurdy) provided colorful renditions of familiar literature. Marina Harris' beautiful soprano voice provided contrast to the instruments with three familiar songs. The facilities at St. Paul Commons provided all the elements needed for congenial and intimate surroundings not available in most liturgical settings.
